## MONTHLY MUSINGS FROM OUR DCM .....

My home group reads the AA Traditions Checklist from the *Grapevine* at every meeting instead of reading the Twelve Traditions themselves. These questions, published between 1969 and 1971, have a way of cutting through my ego. Every fourth month, a few of them land especially hard. They remind me to pause, take inventory, and look honestly at how my actions affect my own sobriety, the health of my group, and the way I sometimes slip into telling others how I think AA should be run. These are the checklist questions that always grab my attention:

1. Do I insist that there are only a few “right ways” of doing things in AA?
2. Am I willing to help a newcomer go to any lengths—their lengths, not mine—to stay sober?
3. Do I ever criticize certain groups because they don’t do things the way I believe AA should be done?

When I sit with these questions, I often realize I need to realign myself. I sometimes find myself thinking about which meetings I don’t like, picking apart how another group formats their readings, or telling someone, directly or indirectly, that they’re “doing it wrong.” Those moments reveal more about my own spiritual condition than about anyone else’s program. They show me where I’ve tightened up, where I’ve stopped listening, and where I’ve forgotten that AA is built on principles, not personal preferences.

I have to remind myself to give others room. Room to grow at their own pace, room to make mistakes, room to learn through experience, and room to find a path that works for them. My way isn’t *the* way—it’s just the way that has worked for me so far. Some meetings, members, or speakers may not resonate with me, but they might be exactly what someone else needs to hear in that moment.

AA is a lifelong process, and I’m grateful for the reminders that keep me humble and teachable. I pray that I continue to grow, to stay open, and to offer grace—to myself and to others—for many years to come.

Dear Friends,

I have been asked by the General Service Board, in my role as chair of the AAWS Finance Subcommittee on Self-Support, to contribute to the AAWS monthly communication letters. I do so with gratitude and a keen awareness that any understanding I have comes from shared experience within our Fellowship.

As a relatively new director on the AAWS Board, it has been both humbling and eye-opening to serve in this capacity. I am especially grateful to witness the establishment of the new Self-Support/Finance Desk and to see the care with which staff and trusted servants approach this work. Serving at this level has broadened my perspective and deepened my appreciation for the quiet, steady efforts that sustain A.A.

Our Fellowship continues to encounter new challenges as we navigate an increasingly digital world. Many members no longer carry cash. Contribution tools and payment methods change quickly. Treasurers are thoughtfully working through new tools and technologies. These are not problems so much as reminders that while our principles remain steady, our methods must adapt.

As Bill W. said in his 1960 keynote address to the General Service Conference: "Our Twelve Steps probably won't change. Our Twelve Traditions? Not at all likely. But our manner of communication, our manner of organizing ourselves for service – let us hope that this goes on changing for the better, forever..." I have experienced that evolution firsthand.

In 2020, when the church where our small rural group met was shuttered during the pandemic, we moved online almost overnight. We were grateful to remain connected, but a simple and sobering question emerged: How would the still-suffering alcoholic find us now?

Without a physical meeting place, we realized how easily we could become invisible. Members who already knew us could follow a link. But someone new; someone frightened, isolated, or desperate, had no clear path.

We did what many groups did. We placed simple notices in our local newspaper. A few members put flyers at the grocery store, the library, the banks, and even the boat ramp. It was not polished. It was simply members trying to make sure A.A. could still be found.

For some of us who had never served beyond our home group, that season revealed how fragile our connection to the still-suffering alcoholic could be, and how When in-person meetings resumed, we did not want to forget that lesson.

We formed an outreach effort that began at the group level and gradually extended into neighboring groups. We worked with our Intergroup to ensure meeting information remained current. We created simple business cards with phone numbers and QR codes that linked to our local Intergroup/Central Office. With guidance from aa.org and by drawing on Cooperation with the Professional Community (CPC) and Public Information (PI) resources and shared experience, we reached out to local healthcare providers, businesses and agencies.

What became clear over time was this: none of these services existed by accident. They were available because members before us had participated, contributed, and remained involved.

Serving as chair of the Self-Support Subcommittee has allowed me to see those same principles at work on a broader scale. Self-support is not merely about placing money in a basket. It is about participation. It is about accepting responsibility for the health and continuity of our Fellowship.

When I contribute today, I am helping sustain the services that allow A.A. to be found; meeting listings, phone lines, literature, shared experience, translation, digital access, and so much more. These are not abstract concepts. They are lifelines.

There is also a quiet dignity in shared responsibility. Being self-supporting reminds me that A.A. is not something I simply receive; it is something I help carry. I stand on the shoulders of those who came before me, and I contribute so that others may stand after.

When the basket is passed in my home group, I contribute not only to meet today's expenses, but as an expression of gratitude and participation in something larger than myself. Through shared responsibility and collective support, the hand of A.A. remains available; sometimes in ways we never see.

## ***Upcoming Area 74 votes in Spring 2026***

**Will be voted on at the Area Assembly Meeting on April 18<sup>th</sup> 2026 (meeting starts 9am)**

### Stipend to Attend the East Central Region Conference of Delegate's Past and Present

"Area 74 will provide a yearly line-item budget of \$1,000 to past delegates to attend the East Central Region Conference of Delegate's Past and Present. The \$1,000 will be evenly divided amongst the past delegates wishing to attend not to exceed \$250 per past delegate."

What you need to know:

The East Central Regional Conference of Delegate's Past and Present is an essential part of AA as a whole and is held at any of the 5 states: Wisconsin, Illinois, Michigan, Indiana, and Ohio. It's important to have past delegates and present delegates to continue the flow of information and smooth transitions in AA at that level. This money is proposed as a line budget item in Area 74. It is not a stipend, nor a reimbursement. The past delegates in the past had to use their own money which the Area feels might discourage past delegates from attending, so the Area has proposed the following motion to help cover some of the costs they incur. The Area doesn't believe it'll cover all costs, but it thought that if some costs were covered it would help encourage past delegates in Area 74 to attend. Your GSR should attend the April 18<sup>th</sup> meeting on April 18<sup>th</sup> either in person or on zoom to discuss, and vote on this motion. This motion should only be discussed in your home group, or at the Area Assembly on April 18<sup>th</sup>.

## Motion from District 05

### Motion to Remove Past Delegates' Voice and Vote from Area Assemblies

#### Motion:

District 05 of Area 74 moves, that effective immediately, Past Delegates of Area 74 no longer hold voice or vote at Area Assemblies. They may be invited by chair or assembly to share experience.

#### Background & Rationale:

This motion is proposed in alignment with AA's guiding principles of rotation, participation, and balance between authority and responsibility. While the experience of Past Delegates is deeply valued and respected, their continued voice and vote at assemblies raises concerns in the following areas:

1. Spirit of Rotation – Alcoholics Anonymous has long upheld the principle of rotation to encourage fresh leadership and the equitable sharing of service opportunities. Continuing to extend formal participation to Past Delegates may limit this dynamic by sustaining influence from individuals no longer currently serving in elected positions.
2. Right of Participation (Concept IV) – This Concept affirms the right of all current trusted servants to participate fully in decisions affecting their roles. When Past Delegates maintain voice and vote, it can dilute the voice of those currently serving in official capacities.
3. Authority and Responsibility Must Match (Concept X) – Voting privileges imply a level of authority. However, Past Delegates do not hold current service responsibilities within the Area structure.

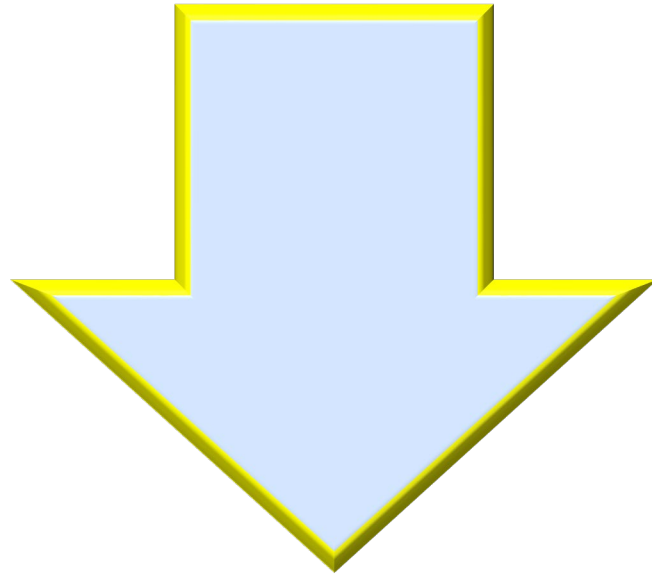
Removing their vote ensures that only those with direct accountability and active roles make decisions affecting the Area.

District 06 of Area 74 has expressed that they stand in unity with the District 05 Motion.

The A.A. service manual in the Chapter "The Area Assembly and Activities" Section "Eligibility to Vote" states the following "Generally speaking, all committee members and officers and all G.S.R.s have one vote each in an assembly. Experience indicates that even though committee members and area officers are members of a group in the area that is represented by a G.S.R., they are entitled to a vote at the assembly. Alternates normally vote if the regular D.C.M. or G.S.R is not present."

The A.A. service manual in the Chapter "The Area Committee" Section "Past Delegates" states the following "but a role for the past delegate is gradually emerging that involves them in area activities and gives the area the benefit of their experience with worldwide A.A. but leaves area committees and new delegates free to run their own show." This section further states "They are called in for consultation or for special assignments, such as chairing area sharing sessions, speaking at special meetings designed to inform members about A.A. worldwide, or conducting workshops or orientation meetings for new G.S.R.s. Frequently, they are in line for committee chairperson of a state or provincial convention. Or they may be appointed by the area chairperson to be responsible for area public information, or to urge more widespread distribution of Conference-approved literature and the A.A. Grapevine."

This motion does not restrict the ability of Past Delegates to attend assemblies as observers or to be invited to speak or advise informally when their experience is sought. It simply reaffirms that governance and decision-making authority reside with those currently entrusted to serve.

And should old thoughts of past occur, they're really not a threat  
I use then now to stay on track, remember, not regret

## *Twelve Suggested Points of AA Tradition*

by Bill W. Grapevine, April 1946

### [Bill's first General Presentation of the Traditions to the Groups]

Nobody invented Alcoholics Anonymous. It grew. Trial and error has produced a rich experience. Little by little we have been adopting the lessons of that experience, first as policy and then as Tradition. That process still goes on and we hope it never stops. Should we ever harden too much, the letter might crush the spirit. We could victimize ourselves by petty rules and prohibitions; we could imagine that we had said the last word. We might even be asking alcoholics to accept our rigid ideas or stay away. We never stifle progress like that!

Yet the lessons of our experience count for a great deal -- a very great deal, we are each convinced. The first written record of AA experience was the book "Alcoholics Anonymous." It was addressed to the heart of our foremost problem -- release from the alcohol obsession. It contained personal experiences of drinking and recovery and a statement of those divine but ancient principles, which have brought us a miraculous regeneration. Since publication of "Alcoholics Anonymous" in 1939 we have grown from 100 to 24,000 members. Seven years have passed; seven years, of vast experience with our next greatest undertaking -- the problem of living and working together. This is today our main concern. If we can succeed in this adventure -- and keep succeeding -- then, and only then, will our future be secure.

Since personal calamity holds us in bondage no more, our most challenging concern has become the future of Alcoholics Anonymous; how to preserve among us AAs such a powerful unity that neither weakness of persons nor the strain and strife of these troubled times can harm our common cause. We know that Alcoholics Anonymous must continue to live. Else, save few exceptions, we and our fellow alcoholics throughout the world will surely resume the hopeless journey to oblivion.

Almost any AA can tell you what our group problems are. Fundamentally they have to do with our relations, one with the other, and with the world outside. They involve relations of the AA to the group, the relation of the group to Alcoholics Anonymous as a whole, and the place of Alcoholics Anonymous in that troubled sea called modern society, where all of humankind must presently shipwreck or find haven. Terribly relevant is the problem of our basic structure and our attitude toward those ever pressing questions of leadership, money, and authority. The future way well depend on how we feel and act about things that are controversial and how we regard our public relations. Our final destiny will surely hang upon what we presently decide to do with these danger-fraught issues!

Now comes the crux of our discussion. It is this: Have we yet acquired sufficient experience to state clear-cut policies on these, our chief concerns? Can we now declare general principles which could grow into vital Traditions - Traditions sustained in the heart of each AA by his own deep conviction and by the common consent of his fellows? That is the question. Though full answers to all our perplexities may never be found, I'm sure we have come at least to a vantage point whence we can discern the main outlines of a body of Tradition; which, God willing, can stand as an effective guard against all the ravages of time and circumstance.

Acting upon the persistent urge of old AA friends, (Ed. Note - Particularly Earl T. from Chicago) and upon the conviction that general agreement and consent between our members is now possible, I shall venture to place in words these suggestions for an Alcoholics Anonymous Tradition of Relations -- Twelve Points to Assure Our Future.

#### **Our AA experience has taught us that:**

1. Each member of Alcoholics Anonymous is but a small part of a great whole. AA must continue to live or most of us will surely die. Hence our common welfare comes first. But individual welfare follows close afterward.
2. For our group purpose there is but one ultimate authority -- a loving God as he may express himself in our group conscience.
3. Our membership ought to include all who suffer alcoholism. Hence we may refuse none who wish to recover. Nor ought AA membership ever depend upon money or conformity. Any two or three alcoholics gathered together for sobriety may call themselves an AA group.
4. With respect to its own affairs, each AA group should be responsible to no other authority than its own conscience. But when its plans concern the welfare of neighboring groups also, those groups ought to be consulted. And no group, regional committee, or individual should ever take any action that might greatly affect AA as a whole without conferring with the trustees of the Alcoholic Foundation [now the General Service Board]. On such issues our common welfare is paramount.

## ***Twelve Suggested Points of AA Tradition – Cont.***

5. Each Alcoholics Anonymous group ought to be a spiritual entity having but one primary purpose -- that of carrying its message to the alcoholic who still suffers.

6. Problems of money, property and authority may easily divert us from our primary spiritual aim. We think, therefore, that any considerable property of genuine use to AA should be separately incorporated and managed, thus dividing the material from the spiritual. An AA group, as such, should never go into business. Secondary aids to AA such as clubs or hospitals which require much property or administration, ought to be so set apart that, if necessary, they can be freely discarded by the groups. The management of these special facilities should be the sole responsibility of those people, whether AAs or not, who financially support them. For our clubs, we prefer AA managers. But hospitals, as well as other places of recuperation, ought to be well outside AA -- and medically supervised. An AA group may cooperate with anyone, but should bind itself to no one.

7. The AA groups themselves ought to be fully supported by the voluntary contributions of their own members. We think that each group should soon achieve this ideal; that any public solicitation of funds using the name of Alcoholics Anonymous is highly dangerous; that acceptance of large gifts from any source or of contributions carrying any obligation whatever is usually unwise. Then, too, we view with much concern those AA treasuries which continue, beyond prudent reserves, to accumulate funds for no stated AA purpose. Experience has often warned us that nothing can so surely destroy our spiritual heritage as futile disputes over property, money, and authority.

8. Alcoholics Anonymous should remain forever non-professional. We define professionalism as the occupation of counseling alcoholics for fee or hire. But we may employ alcoholics where they are going to perform those full-time services for which we might otherwise have to engage nonalcoholics. Such special services may be well recompensed. But personal Twelfth Step work is never to be paid for.

9. Each AA group needs the least possible organization. Rotating leadership is usually the best. The small group may elect its secretary, the larger group its rotating committee, and the groups of a large metropolitan area their central committee, which often employs a full time secretary. The trustees of the Alcoholic Foundation are, in effect, our general service committee. They are the custodians of our AA Tradition and the receivers of voluntary AA contributions by which they maintain AA general Headquarters and our general secretary at New York. They are authorized by the groups to handle our overall public relations and they guarantee the integrity of our principal publication, the AA Grapevine. All such representatives are to be guided in the spirit of service, for true leaders in AA are but trusted and experienced servants of the whole. They derive no real authority from their titles. Universal respect is the key to their usefulness.

10. No AA group or members should ever, in such a way as to implicate AA, express any opinion on outside controversial issues -- particularly those of politics, alcohol reform or sectarian religion. The Alcoholics Anonymous groups oppose no one. Concerning such matters they can express no views whatever.

11. Our relations with the outside world should be characterized by modesty and anonymity. We think AA ought to avoid sensational advertising. Our public relations should be guided by the principle of attraction rather than promotion. There is never need to praise ourselves. We feel it better to let our friends recommend us.

12. And finally, we of Alcoholics Anonymous believe that the principle of anonymity has an immense spiritual significance. It reminds us that we are to place principles before personalities; that we are actually to practice a truly humble modesty. This to the end that our great blessings may never spoil us; that we shall forever live in thankful contemplation of him who presides over us all.

May it be urged that while these principles have been stated in rather positive language they are still only suggestions for our future. We of Alcoholics Anonymous have never enthusiastically responded to any assumption of personal authority. Perhaps it is well for AA that this is true. So I offer these suggestions neither as one man's dictum nor as a creed of any kind, but rather as a first attempt to portray that group ideal toward which we have assuredly been led by a Higher Power these ten years past.

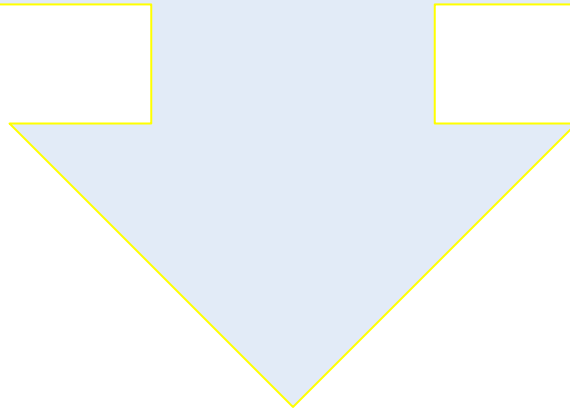

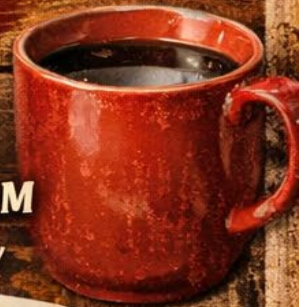
